Students must also **complete the one-page graphic organizer** (reverse) and an in-class assignment (comprehension test, graded discussion, etc.) to receive credit in ELA class. Parents, consider reading the book alongside your child, as books are a great way to start a discussion!

**6th Grade:** *Maniac Magee by* Jerry Spinelli (Amazon: 6.78)

Jeffrey Lionel "Maniac" Magee might have lived a normal life if a freak accident hadn't made him an orphan. After living with his unhappy and uptight aunt and uncle for eight years, he decides to run—and not just run away, but run. This is where the myth of Maniac Magee begins, as he changes the lives of a racially divided small town with his amazing and legendary feats.



7th Grade: Stand Tall by Joan Bauer (Amazon: \$9.59)

Tree, a six-foot-three-inch twelve-year-old, copes with his parents' recent divorce and his failure as an athlete by helping his grandfather, a Vietnam vet and recent amputee, and Sophie, a new girl at school.



8th Grade: The House on Mango Street by Sandra Cisneros (Amazon: \$7.33)

"The House on Mango Street" by Sandra Cisneros is a coming-of-age novel told through vignettes, following Esperanza Cordero, a young Latina girl, as she navigates life in a Chicago barrio. The story explores themes of identity, belonging, gender roles, and the immigrant experience, focusing on Esperanza's yearning for a better life and a more beautiful home beyond Mango Street.
